BUNCO FUN



YARD WASTE RULES

Yard waste pickup is every Tuesday and Friday unless they fall on a holiday. ONLY organic material such as branches and plant material will be picked up but must be in plastic garbage bags or tied together in bundles and left at the curb or end of your driveway.

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Meet Your Neighbors

PROTECT YOUR CREDIT CARDS

When you're going on a trip, instead of using your credit cards, get a prepaid credit card and use that. That will protect your card numbers from being stolen.

There are a number of ways your credit card numbers can be stolen. In today's digital world, your physical credit cards may no longer be a hacker's prime target. But that doesn't mean they can't still get their hands on your credit card number. Here are a few credit card theft practices to watch out for:



PHISHING EMAILS AND TEXTS LEADING TO FRAUDULENT WEBSITES

Phishing emails often look legitimate on the surface, but these fraudulent messages are crafted with a nefarious purpose. Many phishing emails try to get you to click a button or link that takes you to a familiar-looking fraudulent site to enter your account information. Phishing text messages are similar and often try to mimic messages from your financial institution or even from loved ones. Phishing emails and texts may also prompt you to click a link or download a file containing spyware, which hackers can use to export your card details and other information.

Another common phishing tactic is to provide an urgent (and entirely bogus) reason that you need to call a company, like your credit card company or the Social Security office. The email or text will list a fraudulent phone number and, when you call, request your personal information and even your card details to "confirm your identity." Now they have your cards and credentials.

PUBLIC WI-FI NETWORKS

Public internet networks, like the ones you find in hotels and airports, can easily put you at risk if you enter your account information or open sensitive documents and someone is monitoring the network. Make sure to use a virtual private network (VPN) if you use the internet away from home.

SHOULDER SURFING

Another thing to keep an eye out for while in public is who might be taking a good look at your screen. Shoulder surfing involves someone looking at someone else's computer screen — sometimes over their shoulder, but sometimes from far away using cameras or binoculars — and reading the login information they input.

Be careful about where you sit in public while working on your laptop and try to avoid going to sites where you might need to input your card information or account information.

UNSECURED WEBSITES

There are millions of e-commerce websites out there, but not all of them are secure. Some sites, especially those hosted in another country, could wind up leaking your information in a security breach.

MAJOR DATA BREACHES

Large institutions, including banks and retail businesses, can be susceptible to targeted data breaches that put your credit card information and other personal details at risk. Some of the biggest data breaches of the last decade, including a Capital One data breach in 2019 and Equifax breach in 2017, have led to tens of millions of consumers having their information stolen.

Even data breaches not directly related to credit cards could put you at risk, like the data breach from National Public Data, a background check company, in August of 2024. This breach exposed millions of Social Security numbers across the web, leaving those affected vulnerable to identity theft.

YOUR TRASH

Some thieves will still try to steal your credit card data the old-fashioned way — by sifting through your trash. Your trash can be a treasure trove of credit card and account numbers or for figuring out which companies you use for your savings or investment accounts, so it still pays to shred physical copies of your information before disposing of it.

In conclusion, there are many ways for bad guys to steal your credit card numbers. The above are just a few that are the most common. In today's world, you need to think before acting to keep your credit card numbers safe.

It's not a matter of "Will it happen to me?" It's more of "When will it happen to me?"

FIFTY IS NIFTY CLUB





HISTORY OF THE MEADOWS VETERANS CLUB

The Meadows' Veterans Club started when Donna Carrier became manager. She encouraged two of our veterans to recruit other veterans to get together informally. From that meeting of four, things really took off.

The club has 26 active members, including three women who meet every Tuesday morning. All service branches are represented except for the newly created Space Force. In the past, they have sponsored food and clothing drives, took part in Operation Shoebox, where personal supplies are packed in shoeboxes for homeless vets, and recently donated \$500 to Fisher House, the veterans' equivalent to the Ronald McDonald houses, for veterans' families as they go through treatment at the VA hospital. Recently, the club collaborated with the HOA and The Meadows' management and donated \$1,000 to purchase three benches throughout the community for the convenience of residents who love to walk but need a place to rest.

On November 11, 2021, they dedicated our Veterans Park after our manager, Donna Carrier, secured funding through Cove. The park contains 245 memorial bricks that residents purchased to commemorate their loved ones who served in the Armed Forces, the oldest is a resident's third great-grandfather who served in the Civil War. Bricks continue to be added and dedicated.

The park also boasts stone benches, flowerpots, and commemorative statutes. It flies the flags of all the branches of the service and a huge flagpole that proudly displays Old Glory (thank you, Cove, for purchasing that heavy-duty pole—it was the only flagpole to survive Hurricane Milton).

Our newsletter contains a Veterans Club page each month highlighting the club's activities, including pictures of its latest events. The club has a club historian, Doug Heise, who keeps meticulous scrapbooks of the club's activities.

The club provides many services, not only to other vets but to all residents. You will see them out before storms, helping residents secure their homes and doing cleanup afterward. They accompany other vets to doctor appointments at the VA clinic. They will accompany family members of vets to pick up their loved ones' ashes. They have done several full funerals, complete with a chaplain, speakers, presentation of an American flag to the survivors, and taps. After our recent hurricanes, the club collected and distributed food, clothing, cleaning supplies, and paper products to local shelters.

They have a program where, on every patriotic holiday, a group, including some non-veterans, goes around the community and places small American flags attached to each home's coach light. It's quite a sight. Then, on those holidays, they hold a ceremony at our Veterans Park to commemorate Memorial Day, the 4th of July, 911, and Veterans Day.

Several times a year, the club holds spaghetti supper nights and pancake breakfasts, only asking for a freewill donation. These events are huge successes, so much so that they've had to resort to multiple sittings in our clubhouse to feed everyone in a timely manner.

Now, they need our help! Hurricane Milton damaged the service flagpoles beyond repair and the club needs to raise the money to replace them with steel poles instead of aluminum.

SUPERAGERS


We define SuperAgers as those who age well into their 80s and 90s while retaining cognitive and physical abilities through healthy exercise, diet, mental activities, and a social life.
