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



Ingredients (per drink):

- · 2 oz vodka
- 1 oz coffee liqueur (like Kahlúa)
- 1 oz heavy cream (or half-and-half for lighter version)
- Ice cubes
- Optional garnish: whipped cream, chocolate shavings, candy eyeballs, or a drizzle of chocolate syrup

Instructions:

- 1. Fill a short glass (rocks glass) with ice.
- Pour in the vodka and coffee liqueur. Stir gently.
- Slowly float the cream on top by pouring it over the back of a spoon (gives that ghostly layered effect).
- 4. For a festive Halloween touch, top with a swirl of whipped cream and stick in a candy eye or drizzle chocolate for a "dripping blood" look.






1. Melt the chocolate – In a microwave-safe bowl, melt the white chocolate chips in 20–30 second intervals, stirring between each until smooth. Let cool slightly.

- 2. Mix the filling In a large mixing bowl, beat the softened cream cheese, powdered sugar, pumpkin puree, and pumpkin pie spice until smooth.
- 3. Add crumbs Stir in graham cracker crumbs and gingersnap crumbs until fully combined.
- 4. Shape balls Roll mixture into 1-inch balls and place on a parchment-lined baking sheet. Freeze for 30 minutes or until firm.
- 5. Coat in chocolate Melt the white almond bark, then dip each pumpkin ball to coat fully. Place back on parchment.
- 6. Optional drizzle Melt orange candy melts and drizzle over coated balls for a festive touch.
- 7. Chill & serve Refrigerate until set, then enjoy!

Columbus Day

Columbus Day, celebrated on the second Monday in October, originated in the late 19th century as a celebration of Christopher Columbus by Italian Americans, but it became a national holiday in 1937 under President Franklin D. Roosevelt. The holiday commemorates Columbus's arrival in the Americas in 1492, which led to the colonization of the continent by Europeans and sparked the Columbian Exchange. However, the holiday is increasingly controversial due to Columbus's brutal treatment and enslavement of Native Americans, prompting the rise of Indigenous Peoples Day as an alternative celebration of the continent's original inhabitants.


Origins and Establishment

- Italian American Celebration: Italian immigrants began celebrating Columbus Day in the U.S. in the late 1800s, in part to honor their heritage and gain acceptance in a country where they often faced discrimination.
- 1892 Proclamation: In 1892, President Benjamin Harrison issued a proclamation calling for a national celebration of Columbus, partly in response to the lynching of 11 Italian immigrants in New Orleans the previous year.
- National Holiday: Columbus Day was officially established as a U.S. federal holiday in 1937 by President Franklin D. Roosevelt, with the date later changing to the second Monday in October in 1971.

Controversy and Modern-Day Observance

 Reevaluation of Columbus's Legacy: Over time, scrutiny increased regarding Columbus's role in the mistreatment, enslavement, and death of Native Americans.


- Rise of Indigenous Peoples Day: In response to these concerns, many communities and states have replaced Columbus Day with Indigenous Peoples Day or other Native American heritage holidays.
- Varying Observance: While many government offices and banks still close on Columbus Day, its observance varies, with some businesses remaining open and some cities choosing to honor Indigenous peoples instead, according to the U.S. Embassy in Argentina.



United Nations Day

United Nations Day, on 24 October, marks the anniversary of the entry into force in 1945 of the UN Charter. With the ratification of this founding document by the majority of its signatories, including the five permanent members of the Security Council, the United Nations officially came into being. **United Nations Day** is an annual commemorative day, reflecting the official creation of the United Nations on 24 October 1945. In 1947, the United Nations General Assembly declared 24 October, the anniversary of the Charter of the United Nations, to "be devoted to making known to the people of the world the aims and achievements of the United Nations and to gaining their support for" its work.^[1]

In 1971, the United Nations General Assembly adopted a further resolution (United Nations Resolution 2782) declaring that United Nations Day shall be an international observance or international holiday and recommended that it should be observed as a public holiday by United Nations member states.^[2]

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World War II Allies' Day

The first event called "United Nations Day" was a World War II Allies' day of solidarity and military parades launched by US president Franklin D. Roosevelt tied to US Flag Day on 14 June 1942, six months after the Declaration by United Nations. It was observed in New York City as the "New York at

War" parade, in London, and by the Soviet and Chinese governments.[3][4][5][6][7][8]

It was observed throughout World War II, during 1942–1944. Prior to the foundation of the UN itself, it was not directly connected to the current international observance.

Commemoration

U.N. Day has traditionally been marked throughout the world with meetings, discussions and exhibits about the achievements and goals of the organization. In 1971, the General Assembly recommended that member states observe it as a public holiday. [citation needed]

Several international schools throughout the world would also celebrate the diversity of their student body on United Nations Day (although the event is not necessarily celebrated on 24 October). Celebrations often include a show of cultural performances in the evening and a food fair, where food is available from all over the world. [citation needed]

On United Nations Day in 1951, the United Nations Postal Administration issued the first UN Stamps, which were issued in U.S. Dollars at the U.N. Headquarters in New York.^[9]

In the United States, the President has issued a proclamation each year for United Nations Day since 1948.

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Why Do We Celebrate Halloween? The Dark Origins of the Holiday

If you think Halloween is a uniquely American tradition, grab a mini Snickers and settle in, because you've got some learning to do. Dressing up in a <u>creative</u> <u>costume</u>, traipsing around in the gathering dusk to <u>collect the best candy</u> or throwing a monster bash with friends are all time-honored holiday traditions. But Halloween didn't start stateside at all.

In fact, the **origins of Halloween** go back thousands of years to the Celtic celebration of Samhain (pronounced "sow-win"), a festival that marked the end of the harvest season and ushered in a new year. During Samhain, the veil between the worlds of the living and the dead was thought to be especially thin, so people could communicate with loved ones who had passed on.

Whether or not you buy into the supernatural, it's still fun to learn a little something about the meaning behind your favorite Halloween traditions before you head out trick-or-treating. Turns out, the holiday has a much more interesting (and sometimes even spookier!) backstory than many people realize. Travel back in time with us to learn what some of the very first celebrations of Halloween looked like, including throwback ghoulies and ghosties, what people used to carve in place of pumpkins and even the elements that Valentine's Day and Halloween have in common. We can guarantee there wasn't a glitter pumpkin or superhero costume in sight.

Who Celebrated Halloween First?

Most scholars agree that Halloween originated around 2,000 years ago, when Celtic people in Europe celebrated the end of the harvest and the start of a new year in a <u>festival called Samhain</u>. People also believed they could commune with the dead more easily during that time, lighting bonfires to ward off ill-intentioned spirits, according to the <u>American</u> Folklife Center.



Halloween Has a Dark Spiritual History

The Celts also believed that the spiritual communication on Samhain made it easier for Celtic priests, or druids, to predict the future, according to <u>History</u>. To appease the deities, they built bonfires and sacrificed crops and animals. Villagers also attended the bonfire ceremonies wearing animal heads and skins, which may be where the tradition of Halloween costumes first came from.

Bats are a Halloween Symbol

Nowadays, many of us associate bats with Halloween — and that has historical roots, too. The Druids' Samhain bonfires attracted bugs which, in turn, tempted bats to a tasty feast. In later years, various folklore emerged citing bats as harbingers of death or doom. In **Nova Scotian mythology**, a bat settling in a house means a man in the family will die. If it flies around and tries to escape, a woman in the family will perish instead.

Romans Had Their Own Fall Festivals

The Romans conquered most Celtic territory by 43 A.D. and brought their culture's fall festivals with them, according to <u>History</u>. A Roman October celebration called Feralia also commemorated the passing of the dead. Another holiday, Pomona, honored the Roman goddess of fruit and trees. That's one reason people often bob for apples during Halloween parties.

Christians Are Behind Why Halloween Is on October 31

Fast forward a few centuries, and the festivals that would become Halloween had evolved. Several Christian popes attempted to replace "pagan" holidays like Samhain with their own religious observances. By 1000 A.D., All Souls' Day on November 2 served as a time for the living to pray for the souls of the dead. All Saints' Day, or All Hallows, honored the saints on November 1. That made October 31 All Hallows Eve, which later became Halloween.

The British Set Out Ghostly Gifts

Despite the new religious focus, people in Old England and Ireland continued to associate the end of October with the dead wandering among us. They set out gifts of food to satisfy hungry spirits, and as time wore on, people began dressing in creepy costumes to go begging for the treats themselves. The practice was called "mumming," and looked similar to today's trick-or-treating.

The Southern Colonies Brought it Stateside

The first Halloween-like festivities in America started in the southern colonies. People began to celebrate the harvest, swap ghost stories and even tell each other's fortunes, traditions that they probably brought with them from their countries of origin.

Women Bobbed for Apples (and Husbands)

In the 1700s and 1800s, unmarried women performed rituals on Halloween in hopes of finding a husband. Single ladies used to throw apple peels over their shoulders, hoping to see their future husband's initials in the shapes they made where they fell. They also competitively bobbed for apples at parties, believing the winner would marry first. And in a ritual that sounds downright creepy, some thought standing in a dark room with a candle in front of a mirror would make their future husband's face appear in the glass, Blood Mary, anyone?

Americans Spend a Lot on Candy

Trick-or-treating skyrocketed in popularity by the 1950s, when Halloween became a true national event. Today, over 179 million Americans celebrate the holiday — and spend about \$9.1 billion annually in the process, according to the National Retail Federation. That's a lot of miniature candy bars!

Halloween Is Not a Federal Holiday



Are you interested in chairing an event or leading an activity?

If you would like to chair an event, you are very welcome to do so!

Come in and let's talk about your idea. Then you would obtain an event form, complete it, and return it to me, Bea Koch, Lifestyle

Coordinator. You are also welcome to attend a monthly planning meeting where we discuss upcoming events. No one controls the event and activities calendar. Ideas are shared, a consensus reached, and many successful events and activities have been the product of such meetings. A win-win! The May calendar had many new, original events thanks to residents coming forward, making the suggestion, then taking the lead in the planning.

Presently, we have 41 ambassadors, who not only plan events and activities, but also volunteer to set up, shop, and clean up from activities. That's teamwork!

If you would like to host a private gathering, there is a form for you to complete. This form can be completed and submitted for approval. Why the paperwork when in the past, residents simply gathered on their own, without the intervention of 'the landlord'? When our park consisted of 30 homes, things could be more casual. Now with 129 households, and so many improvements going on within our park, it is important for both entities to know what is going on in the way of gatherings. EX.... You have planned a casual get-together of 25 family members to be held on the new pool patio. What you didn't realize was that your 'landlord' had planned to work on an improvement that day. It's not a control issue, but rather consideration for both parties and accommodating both landlord and residents, to avoid conflicts.

I do hope that this has clarified some misconceptions about holding events, planning activities, so we might all come together for the betterment of the park and residents. 





Why We Flood:

- **Hurricanes & tropical** storms

Be Prepared:

- If flooding is imminent, turn off all utilities at the main power switch


